No rollback of self-financed semester fee hike, says LU VC

LUCKNOW : Four days after admission brochure was released for undergraduate courses which led to several protests due to the substantial fee hike in self-financed semester fee, Lucknow University vice chancellor Prof J P Saini in a press conference on Tuesday—his first after assuming charge—said there will be no rollback in the semester fee hike.

On the fee hike in self-financed courses, he said around 22.5% of the students belonging to SC and ST categories get a 100% refund of the fee. "27% of EWS category students get a scholarship up to Rs 55,000 from the government. Until last year, a student opting for BA self-financed course used to pay for each subject they added, while they were only reimbursed the tuition fee," the VC added.

According to him, for BA self-financed course, one has to pay Rs 16,330 for whichever subject they choose and the same will be reimbursed. "The initiative has streamlined the fee for students allowing them to get maximum benefits of the scholarships," he said. Saini further said efforts are also being made to build an alumni network which can help students unable to pay their tuition fees. "The increased fee will be utilised to improve facilities, including renovation of washrooms and watercoolers. We are also planning to build a learning management system with the help of computer science department where we will have an archive of video lectures from expert faculty," the VC added. Meanwhile, Lucknow University (LU) has decided to add 451 more seats to its existing 2,165 seats in various regular courses from the next academic session, vice chancellor said. This is in addition to the decision taken earlier this month to increase over 3,100 self-financed seats ahead of 2026-27 session. The VC said the increased regular seats will function at the same fee that was decided for regular courses in 1995-96. "While the fee of regular courses and the grant received by the university remain the same, the expenditure has increased several times. For example, affiliation and approval from the Bar Council of India now cost about Rs 6 lakh per year," Prof Saini added. Additionally, LLB admissions will now be conducted through the Common Law Admission Test and MBA admissions through the Common Admission Test, he added. "The university has formed a committee to reform the evaluation system. The aim is to enhance academic fairness," the vice chancellor said.

Officials said the initiative is based on a credit system and includes a free entry and exit option, giving students flexibility to choose, continue or leave a minor as per their academic requirements. Of the 22 minor degree programmes, the faculty of arts will offer 14 in various departments. These programmes will be open for

Bilingual video lectures for LU students

LUCKNOW: The management of Lucknow University has said that it will introduce a digital learning management system for the students from upcoming academic session, in which bilingual video lectures (both in Hindi and English) will be prepared and uploaded by professors for the students to access. The system will be linked with Samarth portal and will support structured academic delivery across subjects. Initially, the university has planned to start this system with new courses introduced this year, like AI & Machine Learning, Cyber Security & Forensics, Data Science & Analytics and Internet of Things. After initial rollout, it will be expanded to all the courses in a phased manner. Each subject will include 20 video lectures of one hour duration. Vice-chancellor JP Saini, said, "The digital learning management system will support students with structured content and bilingual video lectures."

students of all faculties to enable inter-disciplinary study. Also, eight minor programmes will be introduced by the faculty of engineering and technology for engineering students. Students will be allowed to choose a minor course along with their main four-year degree programme. The structure allows entry and exit flexibility while credits will be awarded on the completion of the minor course. LU vice chancellor JP Saini said, "These courses will provide additional skills to students and improve employment opportunities. Lucknow University is one of the few universities in the state to provide such minor degree courses along with graduation."

LU introduces 11 new UG, 10 PG programmes

Lucknow University Vice-Chancellor Prof JP Saini on Tuesday outlined a wide-ranging set of academic, administrative and infrastructural reforms, signalling a decisive push towards academic diversification, transparency and quality enhancement. At the forefront of academic expansion, the university has introduced 11 new undergraduate and 10 post-graduate programmes, and 22 minor degree options, along with five co-curricular and vocational courses for the session 2026-2027. The vice-chancellor said that these initiatives were aligned with emerging academic and industry needs, with a strong emphasis on

employability and interdisciplinary learning. He highlighted that artificial intelligence and Indian knowledge systems (IKS) have been brought into academic focus, reflecting a conscious effort to integrate traditional knowledge frameworks with contemporary education. A significant feature of the new academic structure is the introduction and expansion of minor degree programmes. These are designed as flexible, additional qualifications that students can pursue alongside their primary undergraduate degree. Students will have the autonomy to select courses from a structured bouquet of papers, begin their minor from the second year, and complete the required 20 credits at their own pace before graduation. "Admissions to professional courses are also being streamlined, with Law admissions to be conducted through Common Law Admission Test (CLAT) and MBA admissions through

Common Admission Test (CAT), ensuring alignment with national-level standards," he said. The vice-chancellor said that the university was also actively pursuing reforms in evaluation systems. A dedicated committee has been constituted to examine the feasibility of implementing absolute and relative grading systems, aiming to bring greater academic fairness and benchmarking, he added. Addressing institutional development, the vice-chancellor detailed a comprehensive roadmap for the uplift of affiliated colleges. "Consultations have already been held with government and government-aided colleges, with meetings scheduled for self-financed institutions. Key focus areas include improving research infrastructure, enhancing accreditation outcomes and boosting institutional rankings," he said. To ensure transparency and accountability, inspections and faculty selections of colleges will be conducted online, with all proceedings recorded and securely stored at the university level on the server, he added. He pointed out that in response to instances of examination-related misconduct, the university has introduced stringent measures. "All examinations, including practicals, will be conducted under camera surveillance, with mandatory submission of recordings to the university. In cases requiring re-examination, fresh centres will be allotted to maintain integrity, as has been already done," he added. He further stated that on the infrastructure front, all major works will now undergo third-party assessment to ensure quality and compliance. "Additionally, standardisation measures, including brand specifications in food-related tenders, have been introduced to improve service quality. The University has also submitted proposals for the construction of three new hostels, addressing the growing demand for student accommodation," he pointed out. The vice-chancellor emphasised that these initiatives collectively represent a transformative phase for the University of Lucknow, focused on academic excellence, transparency, and student-centric growth.

Once elite, now empty: LU aided colleges losing pull

LUCKNOW : Several aided colleges affiliated with Lucknow University, once known for high cut-offs and intense competition, are now struggling to fill seats, with many institutions reporting 20 to 30% vacancies in undergraduate courses over the past few academic sessions. Data from recent academic sessions indicates that despite large sanctioned intakes, enrolments have dropped sharply, pointing to a steady decline driven by weak academic delivery, rising competition, and logistical constraints.

In the 2024-25, at Vidyant Hindu PG College, only about 241 of 670 BA seats were filled, while B.Com admissions stood at around 220 against 320 seats. Shashi Bhushan Balika Vidyalaya Degree College reported just 41 admissions against 500 BA seats, and Karamat Husain Muslim Girls PG College enrolled roughly 500 students against 1,075 available seats, reflecting a wider pattern across aided colleges in the city. The higher education landscape has changed significantly over the past decade. The number of colleges affiliated with Lucknow University has expanded from a few dozen to

over 500, including more than 180 in the state capital alone. This growth has increased options for students, particularly with private institutions offering professional and skill-based courses. A major factor contributing to this trend is the rapid expansion in the number of affiliated colleges. From just 19 aided colleges in the early 2000s, the number of affiliated institutions under Lucknow University has surged to 556, including 182 within the state capital. This sharp rise has intensified competition, particularly from private colleges offering job-oriented and skill-based courses. Shyamali Dube, retired faculty member at AP Sen Girls Degree College, said the shift has been gradual. "There was a time when students competed for seats in aided colleges. Now private colleges have expanded into areas where aided colleges were limited, reducing intake, especially in girls colleges," she said. "Students completing intermediate are focused on jobs. Only those inclined towards academics opt for full-time graduation," she added. Concerns over classroom engagement and teaching standards have also contributed to falling admissions. Reports of irregular classes and limited accountability have weakened confidence among students. Pankaj Kumar, retired faculty at Vidyant Hindu PG College, said gaps in teaching practices are a factor. "There are instances when classes do not run regularly and no action follows. This discourages students from attending," he said. Sumita Dutta, retired faculty member at Shashi Bhushan Balika Vidyalaya Degree College, said, "Students from nearby districts earlier depended on memo trains, which were discontinued after the pandemic. This reduced commuting and attendance."
